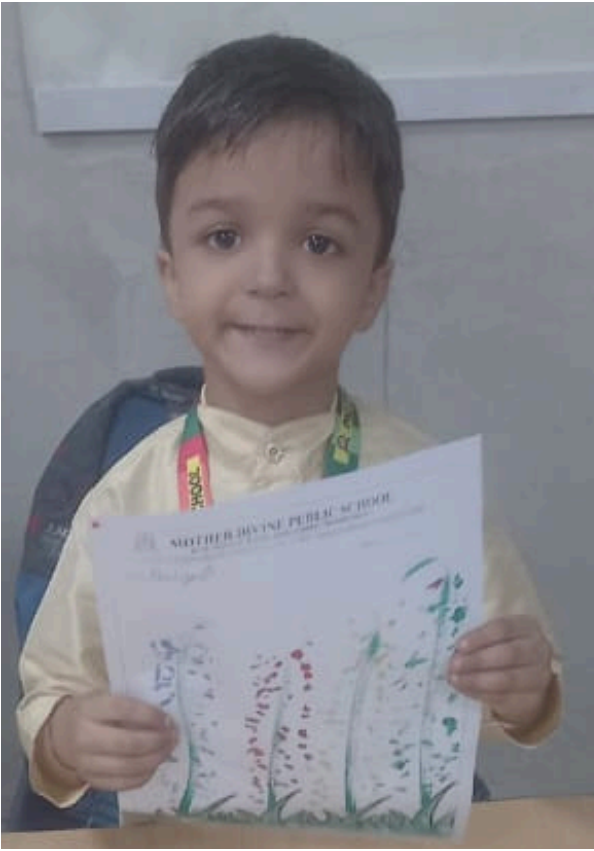
"The greatest sign of success for a teacher is to be able to say, 'The children are now working as if I did not exist.'"

Welcoming session 2025–26 (1st to 4th April 2025)

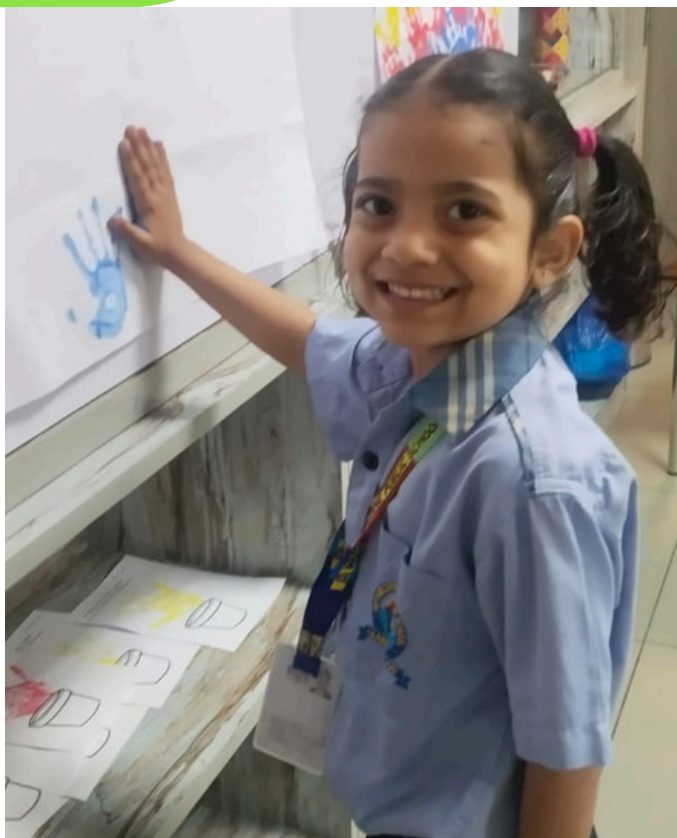
“Every child is an artist, the joy is in letting them explore.”

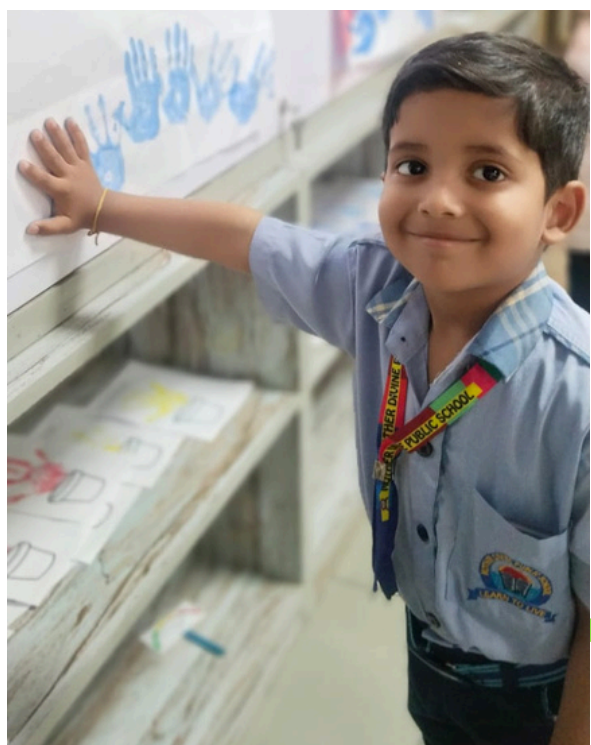

BAISAKHI CELEBRATION (11th April 2025)

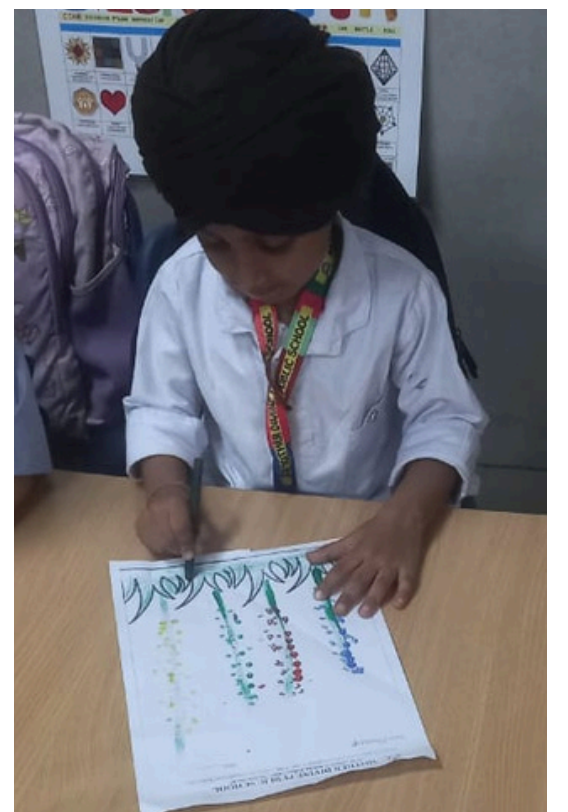
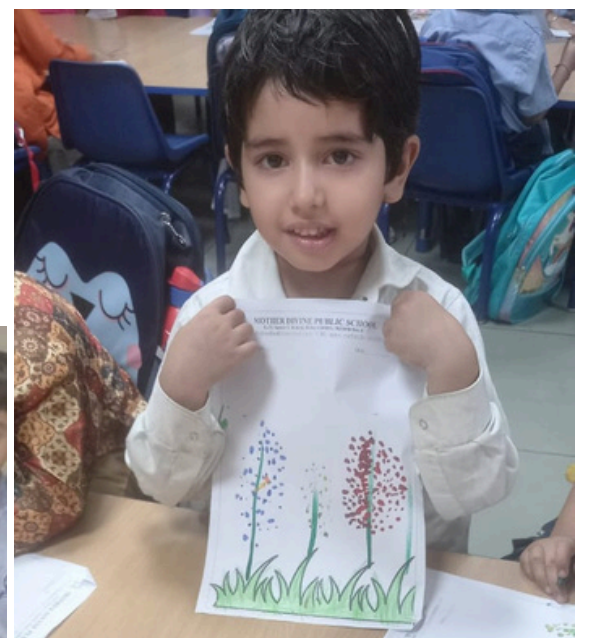
“Celebrate traditions, sow seeds of learning.”

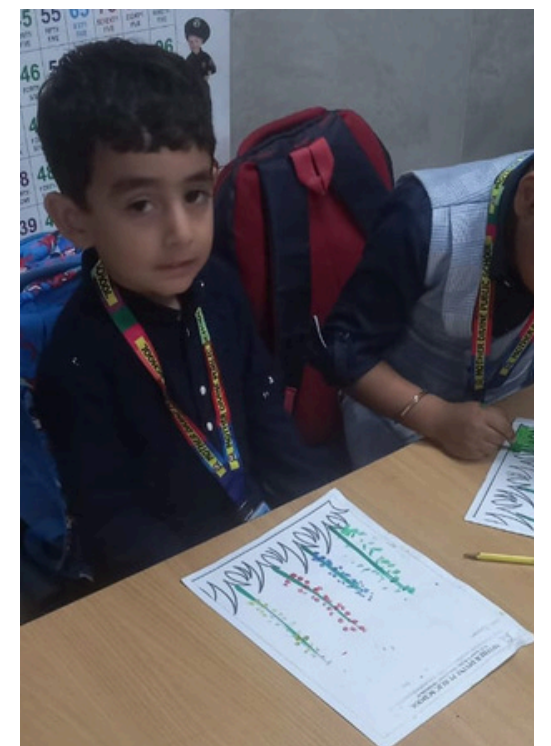
Anabia said - “I love the music — it makes me feel like I’m in a fair!”

A gentle start makes growing hearts.

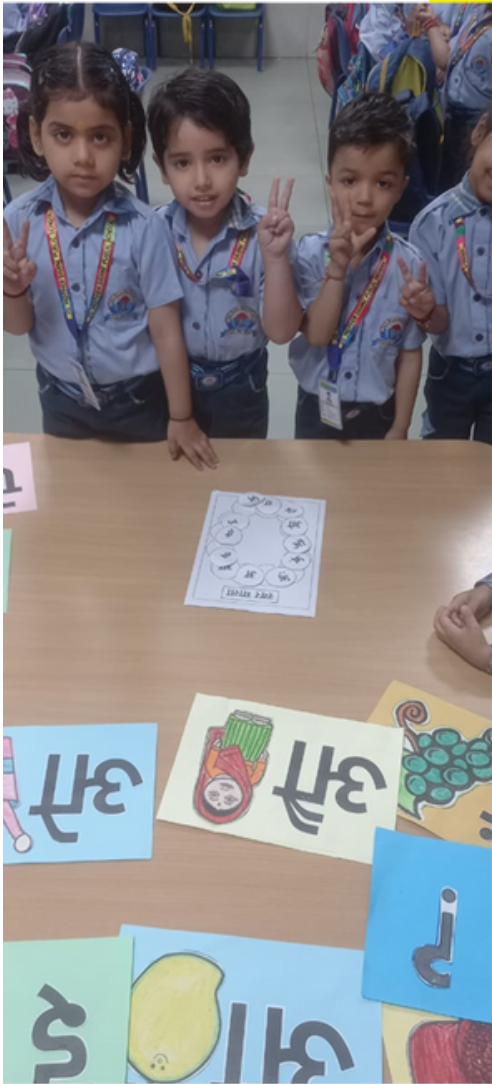
